HDLG has been working alongside other organisations such as the Rural Support Trust to ensure no-one is missed during what is a difficult time for many in North Canterbury.

One of the biggest challenges facing the HDLG is the change in the funding which no longer allows its staff to work one-on-one with individual members.

While HDLG is working to deliver the same good service through catchment groups, smaller groups of farmers, special interest groups and workshops, they are also looking for both short and long-term funding options.

HDLG has joined the recently formed Aotearoa New Zealand Catchment Collective (ANZCC) which will be advocating for long-term base funding for catchment groups as its priority.

HDLG's former Chair Ben Ensor was instrumental in getting ANZCC off the ground and is now on the organisation's committee.

Ben says the motivation behind the formation of ANZCC was the lack of secure, long-term Government funding available for community catchment groups.

He says over the past five years, the growth and success of community catchment groups has been exponential, primarily due to the way they work.

"They are community and grass-roots led and this is the reason why they work so well and why they've been so effective."

As well as securing long-term funding, Ensor says part of ANZCC's role will be ensuring regulators have a clear understanding of what community catchment groups are all about and how they work.

HDLG supports a number of catchment or special interest groups, and funding is available for farming or community groups with a specific focus.

Amongst the groups HDLG support are the Cheviot Irrigators Group and the Blythe Valley Community Catchment Group.

group funding

Group funding for your local catchment group is available through HDLG's transition project. The funding aims to help groups of farmers with a common environmental interest access experts, technical advice or funding for catchment scale work i.e traps, plants etc. We are already supporting four of these groups with \$6000.00 a year and are looking for more. Cheviot Irrigators Group

HDLG coordinator Josh Brown also coordinates the Cheviot Irrigators Group which is a collective of independent 32 irrigators within the Hurunui District. While a number of these farmers are near Cheviot, members include irrigated farms from Domett, Scargill and Hawarden. These include dairy, sheep and beef and some mixed-cropping farmers.

Josh says the group was formed in 2017 in response to regulatory requirements around land use consents, but it is essentially a support network for independent irrigators. It can be difficult for individuals to navigate the regulatory space and understand their obligations as irrigators and this is where the Cheviot Irrigators Group can help.

"We run training days, disseminate information and will advocate on behalf of the irrigators with Environment Canterbury."

Around half of the members are currently working through watertake consent renewals and Josh says he can help with this process by providing guidance and advocacy.

Another project the group is working on is offering a simple, low-cost soil moisture monitoring system to complement other soil moisture monitoring systems. It helps give irrigators a good understanding of what is happening to soil moisture and allows them to make the most efficient use of their water resource. Blythe Valley Community Catchment Group

With a membership representing over 11000ha, the Blythe Valley Community Catchment Group (BCG) was only formed one year ago but has already made an impact.

Group coordinator, Richard Shaw, says there were two drivers behind the formation of BCG; the first was an article in the media referencing an incorrect report claiming that 80 percent of the Blythe River boundary had been converted to intensive agricultural production, the second was the change to HDLG's funding model away from one-on-one farmer support to a focus on catchment or special interest groups. Many of the predominately sheep and beef farmers in the Blythe Valley were HDLG members and wanted to continue to access HDLG's services and support through the formation of a group.

At one of BCG's initial meetings, members identified pest control as a topic of common interest and put together a trapping programme which began in January of this year.

Just eight months into the programme, collectively members have removed over 900 pests and predators including 182 possums, 120 cats, 170 hedgehogs and 123 deer.

For the small pests, they are predominantly using live capture traps and Richard says these have been very successful. These are cheaper and more user friendly than other traps and allow farmers to incorporate trap monitoring into their daily activities.

Richards says BCG aims to have three or four meetings a year and this has brought a relatively close-knit community even closer together.

A recent meeting incorporated a civil defence strategy so the group knows who within the catchment has generators, excavators, fire-fighting pumps and the other equipment that may be needed in a civil defence emergency.

Working with HDLG Catchment Farm Advisor Billy Bartum, BCG has managed to secure \$20,000 worth of funding to carry out an intense trapping programme on a braided section of the Blythe River that is home to at-risk and threatened nest bird species. These include Terns, Blackbilled gulls, Banded Dotterels, Pied Stilts and the South Island Pied Oyster Catchers.

While it is very early days with their predator control, Richard says they are already hearing anecdotal reports of increased native bird numbers in gardens and patches of native vegetation within the catchment. The new trapping funding includes the establishment of a monitoring programme to better quantify the impacts upon bird numbers.
